2022 CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

Twenty years ago, in November 1992 and to mark the 40th anniversary of her coronation, Queen Elizabeth II delivered her famous 'Annus Horribilis' speech. It had been a difficult year for the Royal Family. A month later, the queen delivered her annual Christmas Message referring to the year as a 'sombre one'. This year, of course, it will be King Charles III who will deliver the Royal Family's annual Christmas Message and he too will refer to the events that trouble his family and the world. He will most certainly mention the death of his beloved mother – may she rest in peace.

When we think about the state of things we might describe them as Charles Dickens did at the beginning of his Tale of Two Cities: 'It was the best of times, it was the worst of times'. How would you describe yourself? Are you a 'glass half full' person or a 'glass half empty' person? As a Christian, of course, you are, like Mary, a 'glass full' person. "Hail Mary, full of grace!" The Lord Jesus is always with us and we are 'filled with joy'.

Christmas is a time to remember and celebrate what God did when God sent his only son. There are no half measures in God's purpose and plan. All humanity benefits from the salvation won by Jesus Christ's birth, death and resurrection. There is a link between Christmas and Easter and life's pain and suffering. Royal imagery in the birth narrative

By situating the birth of Jesus during the reign of Augustus and the governorship of Quirinius, Luke provides a subtle but pointed comparison between earthly and divine power.

Bethlehem was in Judea, a province of the Roman empire. Augustus, who established the Pax Romana ('Roman Peace'), was arguably the greatest of Rome's emperors. A measure of his self conception and public persona is evident in his titles: God and Saviour. Yet, Augustus feigned humility by refusing the title 'king' or 'emperor' and referred to himself instead as 'princeps,' or 'first citizen.'

The long arm of Rome reached into each of its provinces which were ruled by the strong hand of its regional magistrates; Quir inius ruled Judea. Luke's mention of Augustus and Quirinius reminds readers of Rome's imperial power which is illustrated by the census that was ordered for 'the whole world' (2:1). Enrolling people was a way of assessing personal wealth for the purpose of taxation.

Rome ordered, people obeyed; Rome taxed, people paid. Ironically, however, the imperial command actually fulfils God's ancient purpose: that Jesus be born in Bethlehem, the 'City of David' (2:4, 11; Micah 5:1).

The gospel also stresses the royal dignity of Jesus, descendant of the family of David (2:4), unarguably the greatest of Israel's Kings. David had ruled, not by virtue of personal power or military might, but by divine election (1 Samuel 16:1, 12) and promise (2 Samuel 7:12-16). Jesus is the heir to that divine promise. Jesus' royal and divine dignity is signified by his titles: Saviour, Christ, and Lord (2:11); the reading from Isaiah adds another four titles (Wonder-Counselor, Mighty-God, Eternal-Father, Prince-of-Peace) and asserts his right to rule. Jesus' birth fulfils David's kingship, brings glory to God and peace to people (2:14).

Yet for all his royal and divine power, Jesus will not stretch out his hand to dominate but to heal. His humility is genuine, not feigned: though divine, he is born as human; though royal, he is laid in a manger; though ruler, he is attended by shepherds.
